Maybe not so much for the big events like the parting of the Red Sea; but for those quieter concerns, when God provides for us, protects us, and offers us that peace which passes all understanding.

This journey of Advent, ask God to walk with you, teach you, and guide you in the fullness of His precious and wonderful presence. Don't let yourself miss out on the true gift of Christmas.

### LAY LEADER'S LINE

Linda and I recently returned from a cruise. We enjoy going on them with a group of friends. During the trip while waiting to board the ship, a group of us was discussing the fact that we almost get as much enjoyment out of the planning the cruise and the anticipation of its arrival as we do the actual cruise! Notice I said ALMOST!

After that conversation, I started noticing people's reaction to waiting. I saw the glow in the face of an expectant mother; giggles of children waiting to sit on Santa's lap; the excitement of planning a wedding; the spiritual warmth of entering the Advent Season.

Now I know not all waiting is fun. If you're waiting for surgery, results of lab tests, or taking the mandatory IRS exam that is now required of all tax preparers and has to be proctored at only a few sites and costs

\$116!!!!!!!! I'm sorry, I got sidetracked; but my point is that there is something special about waiting and we should cherish time spent waiting and not look past the blessing waiting can have on us.

The first pages of Luke's gospel are filled with people who were waiting: Zacharias and Elizabeth, Mary and Joseph, Simeon and Anna were all waiting for the fulfillment of a promise from God. But instead of passively waiting, they were actively looking to the Lord each day which author and Catholic priest Henri Nouwen calls "present in the moment".

Simeon, for example, was controlled not by hopelessness, but by the Spirit who prompted him to go to the temple. His words of praise when he saw the child Jesus, the promised Messiah, resound as an example of patient hope in God; "For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." (Luke 2:30-32)

Many of us find ourselves waiting on God for an answer to a prayer or the fulfillment of a promise. His word comes to us, just as it did to those who were swept up in the events that marked that first Christmas: "Do not be afraid, Zacharias" (1:13); Do not be afraid, Mary" (1:30); "Do not be afraid [shepherds]" (2:10)

As we listen to God in His Word and obey Him, we'll discover His goodness and power as we wait. Those anxious moments can be changed into blessings, joy and peace that surpass all understanding. This brings new meaning to those wonderful lyrics of Francis J. Crosby:

Perfect submission, all is at rest, I in my Savior am happy and blest;

Watching and waiting, looking above,

Filled with His goodness, lost in His love.

from 9am-4pm everyday from 12/10-12/13. Gifts will be distributed



### Christmas Memories

As a child, I sat looking out the window at the snow falling down. Big snowflakes were blanketing the ground. Christmas was in a few days and I was sure they wouldn't be able to deliver the basket of food and presents from the Charleston Civic Association. That was always the best part of our Christmas. We each got one present, wrapped with our name on it. In the basket of food there was always a turkey or a ham. Often there was a bag of candy in there as well. I can't remember ever believing in Santa. We were poor and I guess mom and dad didn't want to give us false hopes on Christmas presents. At least that was how I believed it to be.

Mom wasn't big on decorations yet it always brightened up our shack when she drug out the silver colored tinsel table top tree. She would pull out her small box of decorations. That box held the highlights of our tree. There was a string of bright lights. Can you remember the old lights that were what we use as outside lights now? There were blue, green, orange and red bulbs. Our job as children was to test for burnt out light bulbs and replace them. There also was a smaller box in there of pretty colored balls to adorn our three foot tree. And last but not least, the one strand of green garland.

Once the tree was decorated we sat around as a family and admired the unlit tree. Once my older sisters were certain the tree looked good, we plugged the lights in. It was never certain how long they would stay lit before the fuse would blow. But mom soon learned if she put a penny behind the fuse in the fuse box they would stay lit longer.

We would sit there admiring our beautiful tree while mom was busy in the kitchen making homemade hot chocolate milk. No syrups or premixed powders. She used Hershey's baking cocoa powder and sugar with a little water added to make her own syrup. If she had extra money she would have purchased marshmallows for our cocoa. When we each had our cup of warm cocoa we would sit and talk about what we wanted for Christmas. Each one of us had watched all the commercials on the television and we all had our favorite commercial.

Mom would sit in her rocking chair listening to our excited chatter. She never said a word. She just sat there sipping her hot chocolate and smiled. On the first of the month when she got her social security check for dad, she took us all into town to Benedicts Five and Dime Store downtown. She never bought anything. She just stood at the counter and talked to her cousin Delores while we all browsed around. None of us ever asked her for anything and we never told her what we really wanted because we knew she wouldn't be able to afford it.

After leaving the toy store we would walk around the square to the Snappy Service hamburger joint. Mom would order twelve Snappy Burgers for a dollar. Counting mom there were six of us meaning there were two burgers a piece. It always seemed funny that mom was never hungry and my two brothers ended up having to help mom out and eat her two.

We would all pile into our beat up station wagon. No one could sit in the very back because the floor was so rusted out mom was afraid we would fall through. But we were all happy riding in that car looking out at the Christmas lights and decorations. Through our oooo's and aaaawwww's, mom would ask what we wanted for Christmas. As the youngest I was coached always to tell her something really cheap.

After making it back home we all got ready for bed. My oldest sister was in charge and saw we all made it to bed without any troubles. From December 3 until Christmas morning, we couldn't wait to see what mom had wrapped and stuck under the tree. Everyday it seemed as if something new would be put under that silver tree. No matter whose name was on it we would shake the package and run our fingers over it to try and guess what it was.

We spent many nights sitting around as a family and making paper chains out of the colorful advertisements in the paper and left over Christmas wrap. Mom showed us how to make popcorn chains and then we put them on the front porch and watched the birds peck off the popcorn. But the best and most favorite treat of all was when mom made snow ice cream for us. Our job was to bring in clean fresh snow. There was only one stipulation and that was NO YELLOW SNOW!

My oldest sister came downstairs for a drink of water one night and saw mom sitting at the table crying over her open Bible. I didn't even know mom owned a Bible. Yet there she sat crying and praying that God won't let her down this year. She had done all she could with what she had to work with. The rest was up to him to provide. My sister snuck back upstairs and told us all to be thankful for whatever we got. She explained what she saw and heard.

On Christmas morning we all gathered around in the living room huddling around the coal stove. One by one mom passed out the presents. Being the youngest, I always had to be last. Sometimes I thought I would bust while I watched. First was the one from the Civic. My most favorite and memorable was the year they mistook my brother for a girl and he got a pair of panty hose! That will go down as a classic in our family tales.

Once we all opened our gifts, we all marveled how we managed to get that one specific present we all wanted most. No one ever told mom but she knew somehow what we all wanted. We all were shocked. How did mom do it? She didn't have the money but there they were, everyone's secret toy. Now that was the true magic of Christmas in our house.

Now as a mother of my own children, I realize just how important the time mom had spent with us was. That was the meaning of Christmas. Mom was a Christian but she didn't expose us to church all that much. She didn't tell us stories of Christ's birth or what Christmas was really about. Somehow though as I reflect on those precious times in my life, I realize how Christ was present. He was there in all of our hearts. He led mom to find creative ways to get that special something for all of us. He showed us love and happiness through a poor, broke mom who loved her children very much. He taught us compassion and giving of all we had. He showed us that Christmas wasn't about the presents. It was about the love shown to everyone.

As I close this fond walk down memory lane I want to share one last favorite Christmas classic from my childhood with you. That particular Christmas, mom and dad gave all five of us the same gift. We were allowed to shake it, roll it and try repeatedly to guess what it was. None of us had a clue. When we finally were allowed to open it, we had to do so at the same time. They were all wrapped in different size and shaped boxes. I tore mine open. It was a SKOAL can with a rock in it. I laughed and threw it to the floor. Dad laughed and said I might want to look at it again. I picked it up out of all the torn wrapping paper. In it was a short note from mom and dad saying they loved me. Inside that note was a five dollar bill, my secret present. I wanted so badly to get mom and dad something that I wished for money.


