## **PASTOR'S CHAT**

#### **Pastor Nicholas Gleason**

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well and blessed. In just a few days we enter into the season of Lent. Whenever I think of preparing for this season, I think of a man named Naaman.

Naaman was one powerful guy. He was the commander of the army of his nation, Aram, the neighboring country and enemy of Israel. He was a man used to being in charge. Naaman designed the battle plans and was the man responsible for one military success after another. He was powerful and he was admired. Except for one thing...he had leprosy. His leprosy was not the fatal kind. He was still able to function as the commander and to have a wife and servants, but his skin disease made him a social outcast. Surely, he had gotten the best treatments available in his country but to no avail.

Then one day a little girl who had been captured during a raid in Israel and then given to Naaman's wife as a servant, told his wife about this prophet in her country who could heal him. When Naaman learned what she said he assumed that any prophet with that much power must be a royal prophet in the king's court. Immediately, he loaded up his chariots with silver and gold he could use to bribe his way to healing.

The king of Israel turned into a nervous wreck the minute he saw the enemy commander coming. When Naaman told the king he wanted to see the great prophet in the royal court who had the power to heal leprosy, the king got even more worried. He didn't have any great prophets who could heal leprosy. In the ancient expression of fear, the king tore his robes. Someone in the king's palace got word to the prophet Elisha about what was going on. Elisha sent back a message to the king telling him to relax and send Naaman to him.

So Naaman arrived at Elisha's front door with his horses and chariots and silver and gold, ready to negotiate. Like most powerful people, Naaman was used to receiving a lot of fanfare. But Elisha didn't even come out and say hello. He just sent out his messenger to tell Naaman to go and wash seven times in the Jordan and he would be restored.

Naaman had never been so insulted! This ordinary prophet treats him like a nobody. And then has the nerve to tell him to go and wash in the Jordan River, which up north was just a stream. Naaman had great and powerful rivers in his own country, more fitting for a man of his position. If he was going to wash in a river it better be a powerful river.

Then one of his servants dares to speak up. "If this prophet had asked you for gold or silver, you were ready to pay him. If he asked you to do something difficult, you would have done it. What have you got to lose going to the Jordan River?"

Naaman had two things to lose. One was his leprosy. The other was his pride. God was working on healing him of both. I don't believe that God gave Naaman leprosy in order to cure his pride, any more than I believe that God brings disasters and illness to us. But I do believe that God used Naaman's leprosy to restore him to his true humanity. And I believe that God uses disasters and illness in a variety of ways to restore us as well.

I invite you to consider what is holding you back from receiving the fullness of God's healing. Let this season of Lent be a season of transformation for you.

## LAY LEADER'S LINE

In our Sunday School Class, we've been discussing the book, 'Oprah Miracles and the New Earth' by Dr. Erwin Lutzer who is an author and professor at Moody Bible Institute. In the book, Dr. Lutzer examines the teachings of 'A Course in Miracles' which is a new age philosophy being taught and endorsed by Oprah Winfrey. This teaching takes some of the truths from the Bible and distorts it just enough to get people to "buy-in-to-it". They believe that Jesus did exist, but was only a model of what we all are and what we all can be. Their belief is that Jesus shows mankind that we all are God and we can all be just like Jesus if we can find that perfect state of consciousness by thinking right! We don't need grace or salvation, we just need to practice positive thinking and we can achieve the perfect frequency that will catapult us into heaven!

I was looking through my files in order to research this month's article and came across a devotional from Our Daily Bread (I know, I use this a lot in my articles) which touches on this same topic, so I decided to write on it.

The devotional references a long letter the publication received from a man who says he believes in both God and "the Christ spirit'" but not in "the historical Jesus as portrayed in the New Testament." He doesn't mind that the staff at 'Our Daily Bread' believes as they do, but he wants the staff to show respect for him by acknowledging that both beliefs are of equal merit. That they cannot do!

A belief is either true or false. Either Jesus is Lord and Savior, God in the flesh, or He is not. When considering who Christ is, we choose to believe either in Jesus or our own imagination or in the Jesus of biblical revelation.

We are not unloving when we say that those who reject the Jesus revealed in the Bible are wrong. We follow the example of the apostle John. In 1 John 2: 18-27, John refers to such teachers as "antichrists" who had no right to be counted as members of the fellowship of believers. In verse 22, he wrote, "Who is the liar? It is the man who denies that Jesus is the Christ. Such a man is the antichrist —he denies the Father and the Son." (NIV) Then in verse 24 he informs us to....."See that what you heard from the beginning remains in you. If it does, you also will remain in the Son and in the Father." What had they heard from the beginning? None other than the teachings of Jesus Himself, as well as the dynamic eyewitness testimony of those who intimately knew the life, person, and work of our Lord.

They had strong reasons for believing in Jesus – and so do we! It's not our imagination, ego, or even our consciousness. It's the revelation of God!

### The Mission Trip—A Huge Lesson I Learned

A huge lesson I learned is not to be greedy. I went on a mission trip with my church to Chicago to help homeless and to visit schools.

The first place we went was the YMCA to visit the daycare. We helped the teachers. There was one little boy about 3 who came up to me and handed me a flower and said "You are very nice, thank you." I thought that was so nice, I wanted to go there every day and help. That little boy made my day.

Next we went on a scavenger hunt that the counselor sent us on. We were looking for a homeless person to take and buy them food. We only had \$5 to spend. There was one adult with us. We went up to this man and asked if he needed food. He told us yes and then a lady came running up to us asking us to buy her food too. We told her yes and asked them where they liked to eat. They replied, "Pizza," and pointed at a pizza place. We said okay and took them to eat. Of course it cost more than \$5, so the adult that was with us paid for the rest. We sat at the pizza place for a while talking. The man who we took to eat had been staggering and he told us, "I'm sorry, but I am drunk." We told him no problem that it was okay. After they ate we left and went back to our counselor.

The next day we went to a nursing home and played bingo and chatted with the people. We were playing bingo when one of the men wanted to show off. He was probably in his late 70's or early 80's. He thought it would be funny to stick bingo chips up his nose and blow them out at us. One of the kids was scared when he did it, but the rest of us just laughed at him.

Then we went to the Food Pantry. We served the people food, sat with them and interacted with them. I was talking to a lady and she told me how her daughter was caring for her and then just left her and that was why she was homeless. She looked kind of dirty, but I didn't judge her and she was crying. My friend and I went up to her and gave her a huge hug. We prayed with her and just enjoyed her stories and talked with her for quite a while.

Lastly, we went to Goodwill to clean up the store so that it would look nice. We started going up some stairs to get into the store when one of the adults that was with us thought he was going to pass out as he was going up. He didn't pass out, but it was really scary. In the store we picked up hangers and clothes that had fallen on the floor. We also helped to organize the store. Working in the Goodwill store made me feel good.

The mission trip experience made me learn not to be greedy and to be thankful for what I have. That was my experience.
