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PASTOR'S CHAT

Pastor Nicholas Gleason

Dear Friends.



I hope and pray that your summer vacations are bringing you much rest and peace. A few weeks ago, I had the opportunity to share a meal with the Bishop. At our dinner, he offered me a book he had written many years ago, *Becoming Jesus' Prayer*. He was kind enough to sign the book with the inscription, "Nicholas, Let prayer shape you from the inside out."

As the days went by, that inscription has continued to stick with me. It keeps ringing in my thoughts. Every week during worship, we end our prayers and concerns with the Lord's Prayer. I like the Prayer. I like it because it's theologically rich, and yet, so simple.

But the Bishop's inscription has me thinking, how are we allowing this powerful prayer to leave an impression on our life? Do we allow this prayer to comfort us, convict us, convert us? To bring us joy, to bring us sorrow? To humble us, to transform us?

What do you experience as you lift up the Lord's Prayer in community? I'm curious, how long have you had this prayer memorized? Do you remember when you could first say the prayer from your heart? Do the words just roll off your tongue? Does it lead you into a living, breathing conversation with God? What does the conversation teach you, about God, about yourself?

Let me offer up just a little personal reflection. Saying one's prayer is not the same as praying. When I was in seminary, we used to pray this Prayer every Sunday. One Sunday, I can remember a friend sitting next to me reciting the Lord's Prayer as she was taking notes. After the prayer I looked over at her notes (not that I'm nosey!). It read: "Grocery List: Tomatoes...Bread...Milk...Potato Chips."

Most of us can recite the memorized phrases with ease. But can we pray it? Can we pray it from the deepest depths of our hearts and souls? I want you to take a moment to pray this Prayer. Pray it slowly. Pray it with the Spirit. Pray it and listen.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory,
for ever and ever. Amen.

Where do you find joy and struggle in praying Jesus' prayer? For me, both the joy and the struggle come from that line, "Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." Every week we pray those words seem to stick out. Those words seem to hit me the hardest. In an age of self-indulgence, to pray, "put me to thy will", is revolutionary. Every day for the month of June, I want to challenge you to lift up this prayer. Let me know how it speaks to you. How it is leaving an impression on you. I think you will experience a rekindled sense of power, as we ask with the disciples, "Jesus, teach us to pray."

LAY LEADER'S LINE

I enjoyed a multitude of sports as I was growing up. No matter what sport I happened to be engaged in at the time, I still could feel the "butterflies-in-thestomach" when I competed against someone who I knew was a lot better than I was. Early in my life, I let the "butterflies" get the best of me and would not perform very well. In fact, I usually wouldn't even perform up to my normal ability because I let the intimidation get the best of me. I remember either reading or hearing a story that changed the way I approached those anxious moments. I came across the story again in the May 4th devotional in 'The Daily Bread', written by David Roper. The original story, written by John Eldridge, tells about a Scottish athlete in the 19th century who wanted to learn to throw the discus. He made a discus out of iron based on a description that he had a read. What he didn't know was that the discus used in official competition was made of wood. The one he made weighed 3 to 4 times more than the wooden one. He marked the record distance in a field near his home and trained day and night to match it. For years he labored until he could break the record. Then he took his discus to England for his first competition. When he arrived in England they gave him the official discus which he was able to throw much further than any of his competition and set a new record, He held the record for many years because he trained with a heavier burden and became better for it. I remember thinking that competing against the best or practicing with more than is required, could make me better. (For instance; the Cubs get better by playing the Cardinals!)

I started to look for opportunities to become better in whatever the endeavor. If it was baseball, I looked forward to batting against a good pitcher. If it was football, as linebacker, I wanted to face the best running back in the conference. When it came to shooting pool, I discovered that if I spent a few hours playing snooker (because the table is longer and the balls are smaller) I played '8-Ball' better.

How can this life-lesson be applied to our spiritual life? I believe that there are a number of ways this can be applied, but for the sake of space, I'll only share one.

Hebrews 10:25 tells us that we should not give up meeting together (NIV). I believe that one of the many benefits of worship and meeting together with other Christians is being able to share with those who may be stronger in their faith, or have studied scriptures longer, or have more life experiences that we all can learn and grow from. Whether it's the pastor from the pulpit, the Sunday school teacher, or Bible study leader, we should view these opportunities as "gatherings-for-growth". But, just like the man from Scotland, we have to do some work on our own. Daily devotionals, prayer time, and Bible reading are also necessary to develop a strong faith-foundation that we need in order to prevent being led astray. If you are looking for a church home, a Christian author to study, or a Bible study to attend, I have found that the Holy Spirit will help you seek those that will strengthen you. Who knows, maybe you're the next "record-setter" in God's Kingdom!


