Nevertheless, we all question God's purpose for creating some of the animals or insects that we have on earth. Let me share with you a true story I read in 'The Daily Bread' devotional that I use.


Corrie ten Boom was an inspiration to thousands of people after World War II. She was a lady with strong Christian faith and lived that faith in spite of her consequences. Hearts were stirred and lives changed as she told with moving simplicity about God's sufficiency to meet her needs even as a prisoner in a Nazi concentration camp. Not only was the camp filthy, but the camp was overrun with fleas. Corrie's sister Betsie, who was imprisoned wither her, insisted that 1 Thessalonians 5:18 was God's will for them; " ... give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." But giving thanks in a flea infested place seemed unrealistic to Corrie-until she realized why the guards didn't come into their barracks to make them stop praying and singing hymns. They wanted to avoid the fleas! So, the prisoners were free to worship and study the Bible. The fleas, yes even the fleas were agents of grace, and something to be thankful for.

What are some of the "fleas" in our lives? They aren't the big difficulties, but the petty annoyances. They are the little trials from which we can't escape. Is it possible that they are one of the ways the Lord teaches us spiritual lessons and helps us to increase our endurance?

When we are tempted to grumble, let's remember the fleas and give thanks.



Meet Bill Harrison...

As I looked around Bill Harrison's living room, I saw several pieces of dark blue glass. They are beautiful. Some are on a shelf above the living room window. Some of the pieces catch just enough light to show off their beauty. I collect carnival glass so of course it caught my attention. As I sit there looking at them, I comment to Judy, Bill's wife, how beautiful it is. She said, "Oh yeah. It is Bill's collection." It is called Cobalt Blue Glass.

Bill was very interesting to interview. He knows a lot of history around this area and I for one found it fascinating. For instance, he has a sister who is 12 years older than he. She was born at home. Bill and his older brother were born in the M.A. Montgomery hospital on Division St. Today it is where the Hour House is located.

Retail business ran way back in Bill's history. His grandfather would buy buildings and fix them up. Then he would turn around and sell them and make a profit. In searching his family history he found his grandfather's name attached to several buildings and homes all over town. We are talking about the 1913 on up era.

Bill's father worked at the local Ford garage in town. Around 1947 they moved to their home on Taylor. For pocket money his dad would take wheels for bicycles and put them together. He assembled the spokes, the sprockets and such. Around 1949 his dad felt he could make a living off of bicycles and so he added on to one of the homes they lived in thus starting the Harrison Bicycle Shop.

Growing up his family life was very much that, a family. They played board games, went to church and had family meals together. They always had a bicycle. His mother came up several times in the conversation so it was obvious how much he loved and respected his mother.

He went to Boy Scouts but found it very hard to earn merit badges. He had the desire but his troop was very inactive. He attended all of the outings he could.

He loved to hunt and fish. He told of walking through an open field when a flock of ducks flew overhead. He raised his shotgun and fired. Much to his amazement he actually hit one.

One of the houses associated to his grandfather was in Westfield. He said he remembers little to nothing about the house with one exception. He was really young then. Yet he remembers being in the yard with his grandma. He chuckled as he finished his story; she was killing a snake with a garden hoe.

When he was 13 or so he would go out with his friends, Gary and/or Ron Dehollander. Their mom Marge would haul them around sometimes. One of their favorite fishing ponds was out by the Charleston Country Club. It had a fence around the entire place because the owners raised and cared for wild animals. The deer kept leaping over the fence to get out. Then they had no way to get back in. The owner designed and built a gate that would swing in or out. It didn't take long for the deer to learn how to open and close the gate.

This particular day, Gary and Bill went fishing on their pond. They walked all the way around the pond to the other side where the trees and brush weren't as bad. As Bill sat down and started to bait his hook, Gary came walking up. His gear was all ready so he dropped his line in the water just a few feet to Bill's left. Immediately he pulled in a 7lb. Channel catfish! Ticked off, Bill worked at catching a 3lb. Channel catfish and a 3 ½ lb. Channel catfish just to make up for the one that Gary stole from him. Now that is a fisherman's most aggravating moment.

Keeping up with his real "fish stories", Bill was telling about the time he went to Farrier's pond to fish. Farrier's pond is located around what is now Hidden Lake Drive. There he caught a 5 lb. 10 oz. bass.

Bill wasn't big in sports. He did play on the little league baseball team. When he was 11 or 12 he played on the Charleston National Bank team. That was when the team won the West Division Championship.

He took piano lessons from Wanda Ruyle, which was okay until the day of the piano recitals. That was when he learned he was the only boy taking piano lessons. That was the end of a promising career.

He attended EIU majoring in math. Just before he was to graduate he was drafted into the Army. He went to Ft. Dix in New Jersey. There he was trained in radio and telegraph. From there he went to Ft. Gordon in Georgia where he was trained in teletype. It was the MIL keyboard with only 28 letters. Before he could move up to the encryption detail he had to pass a security background check. There was some kind of delay so he and another guy had to wait for their checks to clear. The rest of the unit was deployed to Vietnam. Bill ended up being shipped to Germany. Once there he ran into two different people from Charleston, IL. Small world. He served 21 months. He was discharged and came home to finish his degree work at EIU.

With his degree and teaching certificate he taught Jr. High math. He did this for a year and a half. There was a shortage in the science dept. He was told he had to teach science as well as math. He declined because he felt he wasn't equipped to teach science. I asked him what he thought about teaching. He said, "It was an experience."

Bill has worked the usual jobs. He worked in convenience stores, K Mart, Superior in Mattoon, Upchurch and more factory work, and at the Charleston Speedway. Here he served in every capacity you can think of. He lived on the premises for a while taking care of the grounds. He was pit steward, rescue crew, announcer, and even score keeper. For the past 23 years, until his retirement, he was a postal carrier for the Charleston Post Office.

Bill has an amazing career in the Mason's. He has been a Mason since 1979. He has held an office of some degree for over 23 years. He is very knowledgeable about the Masons and has achieved great accomplishments. His most distinguished award he received in 2006. He was awarded the Meritorious Service Award. For this award you must be nominated by your Mason Brothers. There were only 16 awards presented in the state and Bill was one of them.

Bill is currently the Historian of Otterbein UMC. He is full of history and fun information about our church. In 1946 there was a burning of the mortgage held at the 6th & Harrison church. Pictured in the photo was G.P. Stoner, June Craig's mom and unmarried Eleanor Rosebaugh Rice. Eleanor has not changed one bit. She was easy to pick out of the crowd. He had a roster dated 1927. Again the names were familiar. There were Sims' (Bill's mom's side), Stoner's, and many Johns' families listed.

Bill had fond memories of the church. He remembers how it was the cool thing to do when the teen boys would sit at the back of the church, slink down in the pew and nap during the sermon. Gee! Not much has changed for Bill on this except for where he sits now! His father was the treasurer of the church. He remembers getting to the church early as a boy and ringing the church bell. He recalled looking at the coins in the collection plate and often seeing some cool ones. He was never forced to go to church. He just went and enjoyed it. It was, and still is, a part of who Bill is.

In 1993 Bill went down to the pawn shop to buy a word processor. He wanted to be able to write stuff down without having to constantly erase it. After discussing it with the owner, they agreed he would be much happier with a computer.

When his mother passed away he found his baby book. There was a box of old letters from distant relatives asking for more family information. There were letters in reference to his past that Bill found captivating. He has researched and found a great deal about his family tree.


As a volunteer he works with the Find A Grave program. People will email him and ask if he could look for a specific name in a specific cemetery. He has walked, read and entered a memorial of every headstone in 4 different cemeteries. He has gone as far as Highland County, Va. in search for family information. There he found a 2nd cousin who actually had the family Bible. He was able to look through it and learn more on his family.

There is one catch to Bill being so knowledgeable on who is and who is not a nut from his family tree. One night he was invited to the parsonage with Pastor Sharon's family. Also there was, Bob & Betty Stoner, Jerry, Sue and April Payne and someone else he couldn't remember. Pastor asked for everyone to write something down that no one else in the room knew about you. He wrote, "I am related to all but 2 of you in this room."

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We talked briefly about marriage. He has been married 4 times. Judy he married twice, (great things are worth repeating.) When he and Judy divorced he told her as they left the court house, he was not done loving her. 21 years later, they were united in marriage again! AHHHHH! However! Bill has outlived 2 of his former wives and Judy laughed and said, "Things aren't looking so good right now."

The most interesting aspect of my talking with Bill was watching how God interlocks our lives, long before we know each other. Bill met Ken at a social function. They were acquaintances. Then Ken and I start dating and working at the stock car track. There was Bill. Again we didn't know him well. The minister who married Ken and I was Rev. Dean Ruyle. His wife's name was Wanda Ruyle, Bill's childhood piano teacher. The best man at our wedding was none other than Bill's childhood fishing buddy, Gary. Now we are friends and church family! Praise be to God.


