LAY LEADER'S LINE

During a demonstration of sheep herding using a Border Collie, the dog trainer explained that because sheep are highly vulnerable to wild animals, their main defense against predators is to stay together in a tightly knit group. "A sheep alone is a dead sheep," the trainer said. "The dog always keeps the sheep together as it moves them."

This caught my attention as to how often we see references in the Bible to sheep, lambs, and shepherds. This was no accident, I believe. God intentionally referred to mankind as sheep, flocks, or some variation to reveal to us how helpless we are without Him. Even Jesus is called the 'Lamb of God' to indicate that He chose to come to earth helpless, weak, and feeble to symbolize what His sacrifice would mean to humans as well as His atonement for our sins. I think it is so neat how everything in the written word works together. Consider the following verses:

- Isaiah 53:6 "We all, like sheep have gone astray, each have turned to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all."
- Zechariah 10:2 "......Therefore the people wander like sheep oppressed for lack of a shepherd."
- Psalm 49:14 "Like sheep they are destined for the grave and death will feed on them......."
- Jeremiah 23:1 "Woe to the shepherds who are destroying and scattering the sheep of my pasture!" (Read through verse 4 if you want to. I shortened it for sake of space)
- John 1:29 "Behold the Lamb of God."
- Acts 8:32 "He was led like a sheep to the slaughter......"

There are many more references to sheep, lambs, and shepherds in scripture and you might want to research them sometime. I think it is interesting that the first people to hear Jesus' birth announcement (other than Mary and Joseph) were shepherds.

In the Daily Bread, David McCasland had this thought about references to sheep, lambs and shepherds:

"The biblical image of God as our shepherd is a powerful reminder of how much we need each other in the community of faith. As part of God's flock, we who have trusted Christ are under His guiding, protecting hand while being surrounded by the shielding presence of others. We are part of a larger body of believers in which there is safety and accountability.

While we don't give up personal responsibility for thought and action as members of the flock, we are to embrace the concept of "we" rather than "me" in our daily lives. With Christ as our Shepherd and fellow believers around us, we find safety in the flock. "

November is the time of year when our thoughts begin to focus on the holidays. Won't you please take time this year to thank God for sending us His sacrificial lamb?

Meet Dan and Vickie Bircher...

Most of our older Otterbein family can boast they have watched Dan Bircher grow up. Many of you have had him in your Sunday School class. The Bircher family has been a vital part of Otterbein for many, many years. You have also witnessed his growth as a child, a teenager, and a young husband and father. So here is Dan's story.

Dan was born in Evansville, Ind. He was the second child of Luann and Big Dan Bircher, When he was nine months old he had severe asthma. His parents had to decide what was the best climate for him to grow up in. Someone suggested they move to Arizona. Someone else said they had been to Arizona and the climate was not any better than around here. Luann's father, Dan's grandpa Martin said he had this piece of land in his back yard. Maybe they could build a home that was as dust free as possible there. So to work building a new home in Charleston was where it all started for the Bircher's. Dan said he was somewhere around nine months when they moved to Charleston.

At first there was Dan and his older sister Lisa. Big Dan was an ex-marine and was a strong disciplinarian. Little Dan said he was very familiar with a particular wide white belt. Big Dan did take them all fishing a lot. He said those were special times. He said most of his memories of his father were of him being sickly. Big Dan suffered with severe heart problems. He worked as a meat cutter at Walker's grocery. The last year of his life he was unable to work. He died when little Dan was ten years old.

Dan said he had great memories of riding around in the dump truck with his grandpa Martin and his Uncle Luther. He really enjoyed time spent with them just putting around. His Uncle Luther was in the concrete and construction business. This was where Dan envisioned fulfilling his dream of being in construction.

When Dan was around fourteen he purchased a 1963 Crown Imperial. It never really ran. He got it for \$50. He would rotate the tires. Then a few days later he would rotate the tires again. He said he took that car completely apart and put it back together more than once (I wondered how many left over parts he had). It was just a fun project for him to mess with. This sparked his interest in mechanics.

In 1984 Dan was working at Mooney Ford washing cars. He saw the truck pull in to unload the new cars. On it was a 1984 Ford EXP, five speed. He watched as it was unloaded and thought how sharp it was. On his lunch break he went in and asked if he could drive the car. They said sure. He went straight over to his now wife, Vickie and showed her. Her first impression was "Wow! That is one sharp car!" Dan told her he was going to buy that car. Three days later that is what he did. Ken and I were very familiar with the Ford EXP. We owned one as well. Ours was gold and it was a two seater. We bought it in 1984 BC (before children).

Dan talked highly of his mother. She worked hard to bring in money to raise her now three children alone. Dan loved to play jokes on her. One morning she was headed to work. She got to her garage just to find Dan had parked her 1984 Thunderbird in the garage sideways. She had to work her car out of the tightly cramped area. At first she was furious but the more she worked at it the funnier it became.

Another time he stole the hubcaps off of her car. She was so upset. She called the police and filed a police report. When she came home she was telling Dan about it. Then she went to get a cold drink from the refrigerator and there were her missing hubcaps!

When Brad was maybe five, Dan took him to Benedicts toy store. It was April Fool's Day. Dan being Dan put Brad up to calling mom and telling her that Dan had just left him. She asked where he was and Brad said, "I don't know." She told him to ask. Then she told him to stay put and she would get someone to come and get him. That was when Dan and Brad said into the phone, "APRIL FOOL'S DAY!"

Dan and Vickie met in high school. Dan's current girlfriend was Vickie's driving partner in Driver's Ed class. She also was my foster daughter at the time. Dan asked Vickie to go to the movies with him and she said NO! Alma McCollough worked on Vickie to convince her to go out with Dan. Around two weeks later she said okay. Dan laughed as he described their first date. They went to the movies and it is a miracle they stayed together. It was awkward and although though they sat side by side, they both leaned away from each other. However they have been together since. They had a two year engagement.

Vickie's first car was a 1968 Rambler. It was a piece of junk. It had a habit of popping out of gear. One time she was parked in the Bircher's driveway which runs downhill. Dan was behind the car when it popped out of gear and started to roll down the drive. Picture this....Skinny Dan behind the car trying to stop it from rolling down the drive into the neighbor's house. Vickie jumped through the open driver's side window to stop it. What I would have paid to see that.

Vickie's father had been in the Navy. He was a scrapper by trade. Vickie was raised by her alcoholic father. Her mother was in and out of the hospital suffering with mental illness. Although her dad wasn't father of the year, she felt safe with him and she could trust him. He always had food for the table.

She remembers once they walked uptown to Spurgeon's on the square. Dad had just gotten his VA check and he wanted to make sure she had what she needed to start school. He had just so much money so she had to stay within his budget. She found this awful pair of yellow tennis shoes that she hated. Yet they were the right price so she did what was necessary and learned to hate those shoes VERY much.

When she was eight years old she learned to drive. She drove from Hinsboro to Rardin because her dad was drunk and didn't have a license. I really understood all of this because this was how I grew up. I had many of the same experiences with my father yet there was a part of me that really respected him in some ways. She grew up dreaming she would be an over the road truck driver.

Vickie grew up as a single child even though she had seven brothers and sisters. Her dream was to meet them. Out of nowhere and by the grace of God, they started popping up. She has met all but two of her siblings. This she is very thankful for. This is why keeping her family together has been so important to her.

As a young family they moved to Kansas City. It was there that Danny was born (just what the world needed another Dan Bircher. Ha ha.) They lived there for six years working as mobile chefs. They enjoyed the work but it soon became apparent they lived as business first and family second. After six years they came home and renewed their wedding vows. Upon returning to Kansas City they changed their lives dramatically. It became family first and business second. So they moved back to Charleston.

When they moved back Dan wanted to open a restaurant. He worked at McDonald's for a while. Then his friend Bill Rooney opened a garage called Bill's Pit Stop. Dan worked there and learned a great deal from Bill. After that closed he went to work at Bartley's as a mechanic and a tow truck driver. Somewhere in here they were blessed another daughter, Debra.

Dan and Vickie now own and operate a very successful business called Dan's Roasted Sweet Corn, DRSC for short. They have the ability to operate three food stands at one time. They work auctions, fairs, carnivals and festivals.

I asked them what Otterbein means to them. They both said it was their home church. It is where their roots are. It is their family. They have watched the building grow. They have watched their Sunday school teachers retire and new ones take over. Fellowship is very important. Dan would like to be more active in the church. Maybe he would like to be on some committees.

Both of them really lit up when they talked about the Great Banquet. There is LOVE there. No one steps on anyone's toes because it is all volunteer. It is where they both found their heart's fire for Christ again. Praise God.
