Sign up with Pastor Nicholas to walk with us and raise funds for this year's Coles County Hunger Walk.

This year's walk begins and ends at First Christian Church in Charleston on Saturday morning, <u>October 1</u>. Come rain or shine, old and new friends will gather to register at 8 a.m. and to walk at 8:30 a.m.

A rest stop will be available for the 3-mile walk. A miniwalk of one mile is planned for those seniors and families with young children who would like a shorter distance.

Organizers hope to raise \$12,000 to combat hunger locally and globally through Church World Service, two Coles County food pantries and Soup Stop. Last year our Walk raised \$11,200. Will you help us raise more this year?

CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local congregations or groups to raise funds to end hunger at home and around the world. With its inception in 1969, CROP Hunger Walks are "viewed by many as the granddaddy of charity walks," notes the Los Angeles Times (Oct. 26, 2009). (www.churchworldservice.org)

In Genesis chapter 22, God told Abraham to take his son Isaac to the region of Moriah and sacrifice him there. It was at least a 3 day journey for Abraham, but he went and as he was preparing to stab Isaac on the sacrificial altar, God intervened and spared Isaac. In the 17th chapter of 1Kings, Elijah tells a widow to get him some water and some bread. The widow tells Elijah, that she was gathering sticks to prepare one last meal before her and her son would die because they had no food or resources left. But she goes and prepares a small cake of bread for Elijah. God intervened and the widow never wanted for flour and oil again. In Luke 21, Jesus sees a widow give two small copper coins and says that the widow has put more in the treasury than other the others together. Scriptures do not tell us if the widow received any worldly blessings from Godly intervention, but I'm sure the reward waiting for her in Heaven was infinite.

Consider the following scenarios:

The earthly blessings that were bestowed on Abraham and the widow with Elijah as well as the heartfelt words that Jesus spoke about the widow and her offering was the result of the act not the gift! 


FAMILY NIGHT

Meet Tom Watson...

Tom was born in Charleston in the old hospital on Division St. He has 3 brothers and 2 sisters with Tom being the oldest. His father was a concrete finisher and his mom worked at Snappy Service and the Sale barn. I asked him where the Sale barn was located since I hadn't heard of it. He said it was where Lefty's Holler is now next to the county jail. He said they sold cattle and farm products there. He recalls the town branch flooding so bad one time there was water half way up the Sale Barn's wall.

Growing up in Charleston was different when he was a boy. He grew up on West Harrison St. Not only did you know your neighbors but you actually liked them. He told of the Charleston family who lived next door. Mrs. Charleston and Tom's father had quite a time playing jokes on each other. It all started with a Christmas card she sent his dad one year. The next Christmas, his father crossed her name off the card and signed his name and sent it back to her. This exchange went on for close to thirty years.

Tom chuckled when he told me about the special birthday cake Mrs. Charleston had made his father. He said he would never forget the look on his dad's face when he tried to cut a piece of it. She had frosted a cardboard box!

Tom told of how he and the neighborhood kids would play war, or have bike races. They went to the pool everyday during the summer. If they weren't there they were at Morton Park. He remembers the wading pool they had. It was so different back then. You didn't worry about your kid being kidnapped or killed by a stranger like we do now.

The downtown square was the center of activity. You would go downtown and do your shopping or whatever. Then you would sit on the courthouse wall and visit.

Tom's first job was selling the Sunday paper. He would get a two wheeled cart loaded up and then he would pull it around to homes to deliver it. They would pay you on the spot. When you were finished delivering to homes you would pull up to the square and set up there and sell the papers you had left.

When he was a junior in high school he worked at Green's Ice Cream Parlor. He washed dishes and helped make the ice cream. He went on to have a variety of jobs. He worked at Coffee Time making donuts and short order cook as well as a bus boy. Somewhere in here he worked one summer with his dad as a concrete finisher. He quickly decided that job was not for him. He delivered furniture for Baker's furniture. Yet it wasn't until he worked for Handley's in Mattoon that he thought he found his future. He hung drapes for them. He really enjoyed this job and honestly thought this was it.

When he was real young they lived in a house that was rented to the water department attendant. It was near the water treatment facility. All he remembers about that place was he was very young and he went up to his mom and said, "Here mommy a stick." He handed her a snake.

A circus came to town and one of the lions escaped. He said at night you were not allowed outside until it was caught. Another time there was a window peeper loose. He said all the dads went out with ball bats looking for him. And still there was one time he was playing hide and seek. He was hiding by the fence when this car missed the turn and hit a tree in his parents' backyard. The police was following him and apprehended him immediately. When they opened the trunk of his car it was filled with silver dollars.

One night his father got all the kids up to go outside. Groggily they wandered outside. His dad pointed to the red sky. He said, "Look kids. It is probably the only time you will ever see this. It is an Aurora." They watched it for a short bit and then they went back to bed. The next day they found out the "aurora" was actually Alexander's Dept. Store burning down.

He had several friends he got into mischief with. Mo was one of his buddies. I gather Mo was a short man. Tom got really tickled when he talked about Mo. They were out with some buddies and Mo was sitting on the tailgate of the pickup. They turned or hit a bump and Mo flew up, did a flip and landed on his feet in the middle of the road. Another time Tom was out with Mo around Halloween. They started to Tee Pee this guy's yard. The man came out with a gun and said he was going to shoot them. They took off running for their lives. Both Tom and Mo were dressed all in black with one exception, Mo had on bright white tennis shoes. Tom laughed as he recalled running away and only seeing Mo's white shoes running away.

Tom played center for the CHS football team. He told of one time when Mo who stood next to him went into the huddle. He started bragging how he was going to take this guy down...no...he was going to take him out. When they broke Mo put on his game face and tried to intimidate the other player. After the play was over and they were in the huddle again, Mo out of breath said, "I ain't gonna do that again."

Tom was the manager of the basket ball team in high school. He also did work with the plays. He mostly handled the lighting but he did have a bit part once. He was a pirate with a patch over his eye. He ran across the stage yelling, "He got away!"

His first car was a 1955 Chevy 4 door. It lasted for one year. His favorite car was a 1963 fire engine red Super Sport Impala. It had black interior. It was an automatic and he had his buddy switch it out to a 4 speed. He loved to drag race it. He wishes he still had that car.

His brother was dating the girl across the street. Her name was Carol. Tom was four years older than her but soon they hit it off. Soon they were married. She went on to get her RN degree. For a couple of years they lived in Decatur. Yet Charleston was home so they moved back so Tom could attend EIU. His career choice was in the medical field. He was working on his RN degree and had hoped to go on to be a doctor. He went to school during the day and worked as an orderly at night at the hospital.

A course was offered to him on first aid, taught by Mr. Mathias the owner of the local ambulance service. During class he got a call he had to go on. He said I will need help and he pointed at Tom and said you will go with me and be my ambulance attendant. Green as grass, Tom really enjoyed this new avenue offered to him. He went to work with Mr. Mathias.

After a while the ambulance service ran out of money. Mr. Mathias went to see Mayor Hickman telling him he needed more money on their contract or he couldn't be their private service anymore. Mayor Hickman said okay we will just combine the ambulance service with the fire department. Tom said he was the first trained attendant and the first week he worked seven days, twenty four hours a day. Thus Tom's true calling was born.

I asked him about his most memorable story on being with the ambulance service. He told about once when Carol was sick. She kept throwing up and he couldn't be in the same room with her because he would vomit as well. Yet he went on a call where he had to give mouth to mouth resuscitation to a man. Unfortunately the man didn't make it. When he finished he looked up at his partner and said, "I don't know where I got this mint," as he pulled it from his mouth.

Tom had no real interest in the fire fighting scene as a child. Matter of fact he would get matches and burn his army men so they looked like they had been in war. He even would burn his cars to look more authentic. Another time he raked leaves and poured gas on them. The telephone rang so he stopped and ran it to answer it. When he came back he lit a match and threw it on the pile. KABOOM!!! The gas had evaporated into the air and it exploded. The end result was it blew the leaves everywhere and he had to rake them up again.

One of his most unforgettable fire scenes was crawling through a house against the wall with his fellow fire fighter Dan Ensing. They were doing a search and rescue. They found the wall and crawled around the room staying in touch with the wall. Convinced the room was clear they left. When the fire was put out, they went back into this room. There was no wall nor anything on the floor to touch. He couldn't explain it but it was weird.

He had two most haunting experiences as a fire fighter. First would have been a trailer fire at Decker Springs trailer park. Three children died. You could hear them screaming and trying to get out. This was so senseless because their grandpa was passed out on the couch and had left a candle burning. Grandpa made it out okay.

Next was the fire on 4th street where some college kids were burnt beyond recognition all because there was no smoke detector. After that it was passed it was mandatory for all apartments or rental properties have working smoke detectors.

Tom couldn't tell you which he enjoyed the most, Ambulance Supervisor or Captain of the fire department. With the ambulance he enjoyed helping people. With the fire department he said it was such an adrenaline rush. You didn't have time to debate what you did or did not want to do. You just did it.

Tom retired as the Captain of the fire department in Charleston. He is currently working on a book about the Charleston fire department. He found it strange that in all the newspaper articles he has found, it mentions how onlookers (and some regulars) would be at the scene before the fire department arrived.

Tom and Carol had two wonderful daughters, Kim and Krista. Kim was always a handful but he greatly appreciates her. Krista was less problems and he feels blessed she let him move in with her and Randy. Tom and Carol divorced. He was adamant he wanted custody of the girls because he was a father fulltime, not part time. He and Carol have remained very good friends to this day. They often share holidays together.

In interviewing Tom, I felt so relaxed. He was open and very interesting. Oddly enough I felt at home there. It has occurred to me that everyone I have interviewed so far I have so much in common with. I wouldn't have known this if God didn't bless me with the opportunity to get to know others better. Life is truly a melting pot of people that somehow come together and become my church family. In ways I am closer to you folks than I am with my biological family. Thank you and Praise be to God.
